Ocean Cruising, From Transportation to Vacations






Cayman Islands issue for the NCL "Southward"

through the decades ships were built bigger and bigger in both weight and passenger capacity. From about 750, to now, the larger ships holding up to 6400 passengers. There are two distinct eras in ocean cruising. The classic period which I define as the time period that trans-Atlantic cruising was primarily for transportation from Europe to America as well as any other world wide destinations. This was certainly going on in the 1800's but for this treatment it started in 1912 with the launch and doomed maiden voyage of the Titanic.

Per the 1893 Universal Postal Union Congress, with regularly updated regulations, mail posted on board a ship with stamps of the ship's county of registration can be deposited into the mail stream at any foreign port with an auxiliary marking of "Paquet Boat" or similar marking and then is dated and postmarked by the receiving postal administration.



Cover mailed on board the Celebrity Cruises "M/V Horizon", ship's registry of Liberia. The cover franked with a 50c Liberian stamp received the ships cachet and auxiliary marking of "Paquebot via Port Everglades", dated and post-marked in Ft. Lauderdale, FL with a special USPS postmark, "Postique Ft. Lauderdale, FL USPS".
