## Paying the Recorder

The **recorder** is one of the most popular musical instruments. It is quite easy to learn, which makes it the ideal entry–level instrument for children.

The left hand is for the three upper finger holes and the thumb hole on the back; the right hand plays the four lower holes.

Blow gently into the mouthpiece, as if you were blowing bubbles. Blow too hard and you will produce a sharp, unpleasant sound. Blow too softly, the sound will be breathy.

With just a little practice, you will start making beautiful musical sounds.






