At selected hospitals, military bases and Red Cross hospitality clubs, soldiers were able to record voice messages on a machine which created a <u>shellac-coated 6 ½ inch heavy paper disc</u>. These were mailed home by the ARC to family and sweethearts of the men in uniform and replayed at 33 rpm on the old record player. Only no wi-fi or hi-fi.
