The connection between the Red Cross and the post goes back to the beginning of the Red Cross when postage exemption was granted to the national Red Cross societies. Most Red Cross stamps are special issues for charitable purposes. They include issues commemorating important events in the history the red cross, many bearing effigies of the founders of the movement.



Henry Dunant, was a Swiss humanitarian, businessman and social activist. He was the visionary, promoter and co-founder of the red cross.

This French stamp, issued in 1964, has the French army surgeon Jean Dominique Larrey. It was for the benefit of the French red cross, is in itself a historical paradox which perhaps has not yet been noticed. In fact, it should have never been issued, since Larrey, to put it briefly, would have made the foundation of the red cross almost unnecessary: if Larrey's requirements concerning a prompt and extensive care of all wounded soldiers and persons involved in a battle had been put into practice only in Europe, there would have been no reason for an organization like the red cross.
