


His activity as a pirate enabled him to maintain his keen interest in nature and he

was one of the first explorers to witness the cultivation of Vanilla at Bocos del Toro


in Panama. He produced detailed illustrations and descriptions of the wildlife of





the student's home address.

He was given a Royal Navy commission to explore the Pacific. His ship, H.M.S. Roebuck visited Norfolk Island. Australia and Ascension before the ship was wrecked. He is commemorated in Australia with a port and an archipelago named after him.
