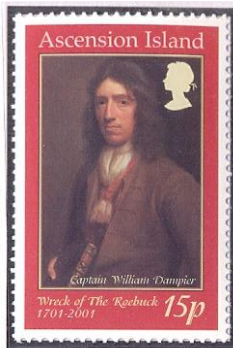


WILLIAM DAMPIER: BRITISH EXPLORER AND SCIENTIFIC OBSERVER.

William Dampier was born in 1651 in Somerset, England near to West Coker. He attended King's School in Bruton, Somerset.



Rare 1908 West Coker postmark.

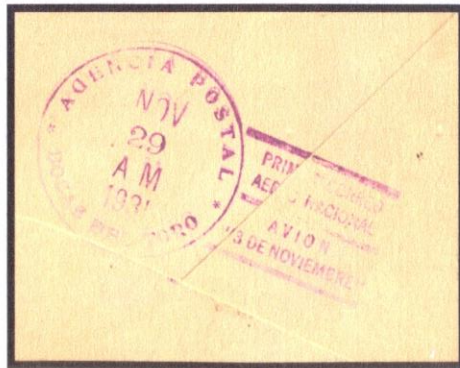
He travelled to the Caribbean and was legitimately involved in logging Softwoods near Campeche and Hardwoods in Belize.



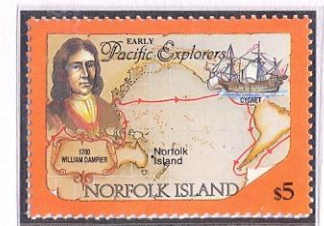
Cardiff 1903 squared circle and a Bruton squared circle for October 24th, 1903, when the card was redirected to the student's home address.

His activity as a pirate enabled him to maintain his keen interest in nature and he was one of the first explorers to witness the cultivation of Vanilla at Bocos del Toro in Panama. He produced detailed illustrations and descriptions of the wildlife of the area now known as Belize like those he also produced in the Galapagos Islands which helped Darwin formulate his theories.

He was given a Royal Navy commission to explore the Pacific. His ship, H.M.S. Roebuck visited Norfolk Island, Australia and Ascension before the ship was wrecked. He is commemorated in Australia with a port and an archipelago named after him.

He ended his days in 1715 in London having left a legacy of maps, exploration and scientific discoveries that Charles Darwin would utilize in his research. Darwin pays credit to Dampier in his work by saying that his detailed observation was a 'mine' of information.
