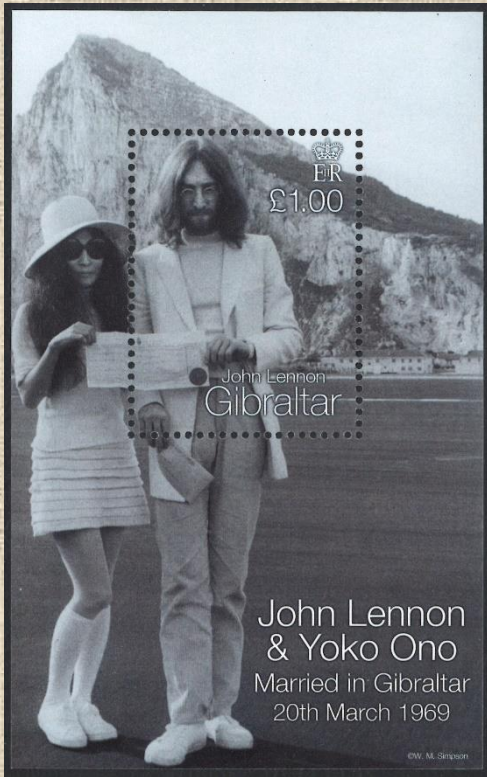

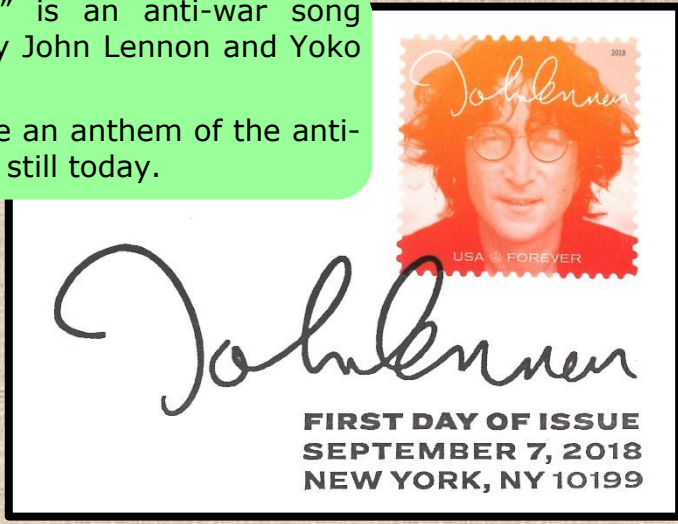
"Give Peace a Chance" is an anti-war song recorded in July 1969 by John Lennon and Yoko Ono. The song quickly became an anthem of the anti-war movement, and it is still today.

After their wedding in Gibraltar in March 1969, John Lennon and Yoko Ono started their actions for peace, which lasted several months and caused a great international press furor.

On the last day of the actions, John Lennon and Yoko Ono had a recording device brought to their room at the "Queen Elizabeth Hotel" in Montreal and played the song live. John Lennon sat on the bed with his guitar next to Yoko Ono.



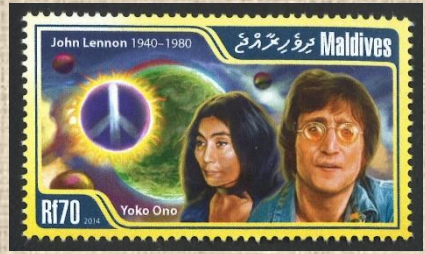
Gibraltar 1999 – Wedding of John Lennon and Yoko Ono thirty years ago



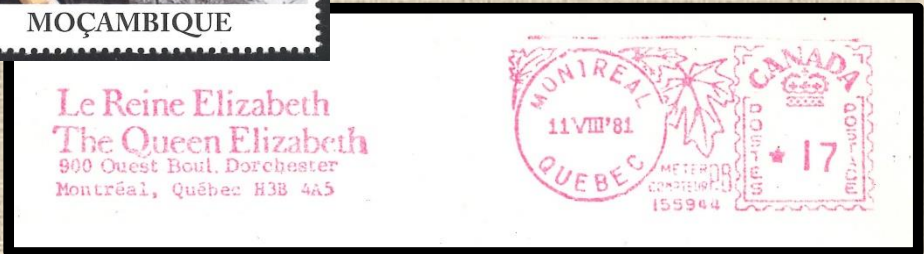
