When I got back into the hobby a few months ago, I purchased a used canadian stamps packet in which I found a copy of this stamp: imagine my excitement! Unfortunately it's heavily marked, but it serves to illustrate that the stamp is made to travel.

I recently acquired a new copy of that stamp, in mint condition, very fine and never hinged. It's superb, and seeing it with my own eyes is a much more rewarding experience than seeing a photo or a scan on a screen.
