





The Golden Hat of Schifferstadt

Commemorative issue for Golden Hat discovery 'X' - demonitized (waste) by the post office after filling of orders for canceled to order stamps

The Golden Hat of Schifferstadt, a Bronze Age artefact, was discovered in April 1835 in a field near Schifferstadt in southwestern Germany, then the Kingdom of Bavaria.



The hat is in the shape of a tall cone, approximately 2.5 feet high and 7 inches wide, with a flat brim, made of a 350 gram thin sheet of gold and decorated by rows of horizontal symbols.

It was found buried about 2 feet deep and filled with a loose mixture of earth and ash while sitting

on top of a clay block. It was most likely used as the exterior cover of a hat or headress, probably for the ceremonial purposes of a Sun Cult priesthood. Three other golden hats have since been discovered but this is the oldest.
