The Yellow-eyed penguin is one of the rarest of the 17 species of penguins. It only lives in New Zealand. The yellow-eyed is the fourth largest of the world's penguins and has a distinguishing feature of a yellow eye and bright yellow stripe that runs through the eye and around the back of the head. It feeds on a variety of fish including opal fish, arrow squid and red cod. Their predators are man, wild cats, and ferrets. Dogs are a constant threat to the adult penguin.
