PHILATELIC EXHIBIT: JAPANESE OCCUPATION AREAS DURING WWII

Japanese occupations thru WWII were significant for the world as well as having quite an impact on philatelly. Philatelic errors resulted from rapid overprints, handstamps, and forgeries, while so many other occupation issues pressed. One could think postage enhancements at the time would be of minor significance in a war effort. However, these philatelic examples show a small amount of the significant effort by both the occupied and the Japanese to keep the mail moving. Each occupied or influenced area had their own way of collecting revenue through postal services. The results of which maintained information transfer, with a humanitarian effort, in war. There were fewer examples in the Pacific occupations that show an effort to censor mail as there were in Europe or the West.

- Philippines: 1942-43 N4 5¢ on 10¢ surcharged "5" in black.
- Sarawak Oval Framed violet handstamp with Japanese characters, not for paying postage. Overprint also with Japanese characters. N1, 1¢, shown with handstamp and overprint.

Manchukuo – Japanese Administration:

Philatelic examples from Manchukuo were during occupations by the Japanese Imperial Army pressing it's influence in this area. As they expanded for secretive "testing" into northeastern China, it was necessary to avoid breaches in security. Philately did not enforce many postal processes, as seen in most occupied areas, trying to maintain secrecy while allowing philatelic / mail information transfer.
