
Chasqui (courier, relay person) was a young runner who carried a message or message. Moving on the run from one post to another. He was the personal messenger of the Inca, who used a system



The chasqui carried a pututu (conch trumpet) to announce his arrival and alert his replacement.

The quipu: means knot. They are woollen ropes of various colors, provided with knots. It was used as an accounting system and also as a graphical writing system. The quipucamayoc was the only one capable of deciphering its contents.
