

We recognize Art Nouveau with its flowing curving and elaborate lines. The ornamentation is of floral and fauna and its central figure is often a symbolic or allegorical one.

The term *Art Nouveau* first appeared in the Belgian journal *L'Art Moderne* in 1884, referring to a group of reform-minded sculptors, designers and painters whose founder members were James Ensor, Théo van Rysselberghe and Alfonse Mucha among many others.

The movement soon spread across Europe but would come to an end shortly after the First World War.


