

A day trip to Mumbai – The Maximum City

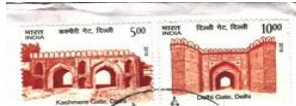

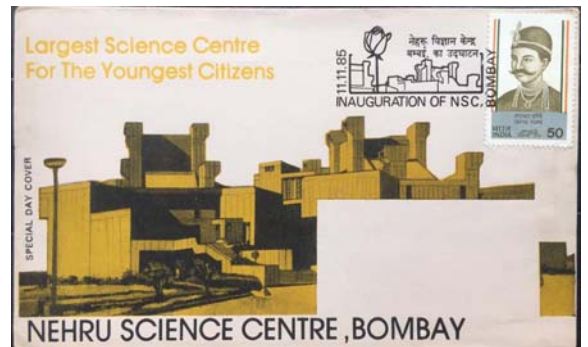


After arrival from Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj International Airport Mumbai, make your way in an iconic black and yellow taxi to Colaba's Gateway of India. From here, regular ferries depart for the Elephanta Caves, a UNESCO World Heritage Site of rock-hewn temple caves, the oldest of which date back to the seventh century.

Film City, home to the film fraternity of the India, often referred to as Dadasaheb Phalke Chitranagari, Film City has been synonymous with Bollywood and Hindi cinema.

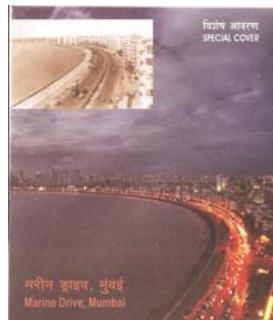
Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj Vastu Sangrahalaya. Earlier known as Prince of Wales Museum and it is considered one of the splendid structures of the Mumbai city. This is one of the heritage buildings in Mumbai, which has been an established museum since 1922.



The dabbawalas of Mumbai have long been a centre of curiosity among the people because of their accurate delivery system that has been never altered its professionalism over the last 125 years. The Mumbai Dabbawala Center is definitely one of the places to visit in Mumbai.
